◀ **THE COLE (KOOL) HOUSE** began its original construction around 1680, by Cornelius Kool, as a steep-pitched wood-framed Dutch-style farmhouse. Changes continued into the 1700's and early 1800's. Today it's run as a bed and breakfast.



◀ **THE JONATHAN CRISPELL HOUSE** was built in 1725 by farmer Jonathan Crispell. It was owned by the family until 1836 when it was sold to the Hurley Church for use as a parsonage.



◀ **DR. RICHARD TEN EYCK'S HOUSE** is unusual in that it has two stories (most have 1½). The house was built by the doctor as a wedding gift to his wife Jenett Baker in 1786 and is an indication of the family's wealth and social standing.

Take a trip back into history... at Stone House Day!



▲ **THE TEN EYCK BOUWERIE** was originally the homestead of Matys Ten Eyck. In the early 1700's, Matys was a large landowner who farmed, raised grains, and created extensive orchards. He was part-owner of the Ten Eyck-Newkirk Grist Mill.

◀ **THE VANETTEN/DUMOND (SPY) HOUSE**, built prior to 1685, may be the oldest private home in the State. The Continental Army used it as a guard house; and a British officer—a convicted spy—was held in the dungeon-like cellar and hanged on a nearby apple tree.



There's so much for the entire family to see!

THE BURIAL GROUND is the oldest continuously-maintained public cemetery in Ulster County. Burials took place here beginning in the early 1700's.

▲ **THE JAN VANDEUSEN JR. HOUSE**, built in 1744 by Captain Jan, is one of the earliest rural Georgian homes in town. It became the State's temporary capitol when the governing body met here after the British burned Kingston during the Revolutionary War.



◀ **THE ELMENDORF HOUSE (HALF MOON TAVERN)**, built around 1710, is a rare survivor of a typical Hudson Valley Dutch stone house with much of its original 18th Century features still intact. By 1735, the house was owned by Lucas Elmendorf, whose descendents lived there until 2008.
